However, we could all easily admit, all things being equal, we are much more likely to have a deep

personal prayer time in the Adoration Chapel than while watching TV. You could easily develop a "prayer corner" in your home that would enhance your prayer life.

Some Catholic churches are more physically set up to produce a prayerful atmosphere than other Catholic churches. The grounds outside our buildings at our parish and school campus have a number of aspects that encourage our union with God and the saints (prayer).





We are in the process of developing one special area on campus that will be devoted only to prayer. Thankfully, our Florida weather is generally good and mostly conducive to prayer—even outdoors.

The Parish Prayer Garden presently under construction is situated between the primary school and the church. We have already fenced it in. It will be accessible to all who want to pray there. Wheelchairs can go up the covered walkway leading to the primary school. All others can access



the prayer garden through the wheelchair gate or through a gate near the back of the chapel (cry room).

When finished, the prayer garden will have 14 Stations of the Cross modeled after the 14 stations in Medjugorje. There will be a concrete walkway leading from one station to another. At the center, where the big old stump of the oak tree was recently removed, there will be a tall statue of Christ overlooking the campus.

The cost is not known yet. But, in time, I will be looking for 14 sponsors for the stations and one major sponsor for the tall statue of Christ.

### **Meet Father Titus Kachinda**

Believe it or not, when Father Titus Kachinda arrived at Blessed Trinity as our newest parochial vicar, the parish was not completely unfamiliar to him. "I've been here for different occasions with the Sisters - for the celebration of the Ugandan Martyrs. It was not the first time I set my feet here," he told me when we sat down to talk. Father Titus has worked in the Diocese of Orlando since 2016, beginning at St. Margaret Mary in Winter Park, and followed by stints at St. Ann Parish in Debary, Prince of Peace in Ormond Beach, and OL of Hope in Port Orange. Five weeks ago, he returned to the US after spending more than 2 ½ years in his homeland of Tanzania.

In 2021, Father was in the process of getting his green card when his sister Gemma, a nun, died in Tanzania. Being the seventh of ten siblings in a

close-knit family he told me he had a choice to make. "Whether to remain and not go for the funeral of my sister so [that] the process goes on smoothly... or to risk going away and roll back everything [and start over]. I told Bishop Noonan that I cannot stand the pain of not being with the family at this moment in time, no matter what happens. So, I chose to go. And I had to wait for 2 [years] and 8 months to come back here."

Returning proved to be a challenge. "I lost my dad a month ago," he said. "I had made all the arrangements for my departure here and then he passed on 10/15 so I had to postpone everything." Father Titus shared that he is fortunate to still have his mother, who is 90 years old. Asked how the family was handling his return to the US, he said it has been hard for them. It is evident in the questions they ask when he telephones: "Are you still staying there? For how long? Why don't you come back here? You know, you can be a priest back here." He is not finding the transition easy either – he has no relatives at all here in the US.

Father Titus went on to explain why he felt called to leave his homeland. "When the first missionaries came, they came from Europe. And they are buried here – they died here. It's our time now to do the same, so, I can't just be a priest and be at home."

The missionaries who first arrived in Tanzania in 1908, in what later became Father's home Diocese of Singida, planted seeds that made a lasting impact. When they arrived, there were 0 Catholics. In 2019, Singida boasted over 178,000 Catholics, 12.4% of the population! The mission territory had 8 parishes when it became a Diocese in 1972. It now has 31. The Diocese has experienced tremendous growth in both vocations and schools. It sounds a lot like our sister parish, BT Nalweyo. Speaking of which, Uganda and Tanzania share a border and citizens of both countries use the same passport. Father believes that eventually the two countries may unite - along with 6 other sovereign African states - under the East African Federation banner with a single leader.

Father has expressed that BT parishioners have been very welcoming to him. One helpful parishioner went the extra mile to help him get his Florida driver's license! Eventually he will need a car but for now, since the Churchill Publix has reopened, groceries are within walking distance. I asked him about menu items. "I eat everything! My grandparents were farmers and we kept cattle. I grew up eating a lot of beef!" Father also loves cassava, known here as yuca. He has some in the rectory refrigerator right now – it is one of his favorite dishes!

Father wants BT parishioners to know that he is looking forward to settling here and becoming part of the community. "I'm feeling it's good here. I'm happy with everything – there's a lot of work to do here. This is a busy parish, you know?" - *Michelle Hernandez*

# **The Eucharist**



#### "Do this in memory of me." - Jesus

The Eucharist. It's the cornerstone of our Catholic faith, what separates us from other Christian denominations.

Every Sunday, Catholics gather at the Lord's Table and eat of His Body and drink of His Blood. In this very personal communion, we are reminded of a king who came, not to be served, but to serve.

"...whoever would be great among you must be your servant, and whoever would be first among you must be your slave; even as the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Matt 20: 26-28)

With this weekly gift of his precious body and blood – the real manifestation of Jesus – we Catholics should be familiar with what it means to be true stewards of Christ.



You know all about giving back to God and serving others through your time, talents, and treasure, but consider looking to Jesus for inspiration on how to serve as He served. Serving as Christ served might be easier said than done... You'll never die on a cross for the salvation of the world. It might even seem crazy to try to compare your works of service to those of Jesus Christ, and it might seem impossible and unreachable to set the Son of God as your standard for living.



Don't get discouraged! Jesus assures us: "With men, this is impossible, but with God all things are possible." (Matt 19:26) God revealed Himself in human form so that we might learn from His example. He lived and died and rose again so that we might live like Him and with Him.



If you still struggle with feelings of inadequacy when it comes to serving others in the way Christ did, look to his very first disciple. Mary was from a peasant village, of no status or wealth, and with no superhuman gifts. What Mary had was her loyalty and obedience to the Lord. Serving Him was her greatest mission and desire.



Maybe you think you're not blessed with time, talents, or money. You're a child of God made in His image, and that means you're blessed with the ability to love like Him. Because you are his child, He has a plan for you and how he wishes you to serve him. (Jer 29:11)





Like the apostles, you might be called to minister and share the Good News in the priesthood, diaconate, as a nun, or as a consecrated virgin. Like Jesus, you might be called to heal the sick, to be a teacher, or feed the hungry. Or maybe, as a child of God, you too are a creator, and you are being called to share your artistic talents to help shepherd His people back to Him.



As you approach the table of the Lord today, ask the Holy Spirit to guide you closer in communion to Jesus Christ.



Take a moment during the Eucharist to thank Jesus for his physical presence with you and in you. Offer yourself to God completely that He may reveal His perfect and divine plan for you as a Catholic steward.

Twenty years ago, after my mother passed away suddenly, I did some soul searching and realized that I was an immature Catholic

(advancing in age but in faith since my confirmation). I was lukewarm at best, going through some of the minimum motions like going to Mass on Sundays and infrequent confessions. Some changes needed to be made.

I dusted off my old Catechism and carefully started to research my purpose in life. Why was I created? What do I believe? I was anxious to really do



something worthwhile because so much had been given to me; and I felt so selfish. So instead of continuing to attend seminars about achieving unlimited success in the secular world, I started learning about how to become holy from the examples of the saints and the lives they lived.

I've been able to twice accompany the BT Uganda mission team on trips to Nalweyo, Uganda. I have assisted in fundraising for their student sponsorships and purchasing classroom supplies. I'm also a Eucharistic Minister and bring Holy Communion to the sick and homebound on Sundays. Everyone can do something!



My name is Sam Mascaro. Stewardship is taking all that the Lord has given me and using it towards its proper and most perfect end. Jesus has assured us that we are already the sons and daughters of God, and that he has loved us first without us having to perform. But are we the fullest and best versions of ourselves? Many of us would agree that we are still missing something in our life, that something is just not clicking.

Saint Teresa of Calcutta (Mother Teresa) once said, "When I see a sad person, I ask myself, what is that person holding back from the Lord?"

My name is Karly Cupit. Stewardship means so much more than just measuring what we can give. Stewardship is the grateful response we make to the ever-loving God who has given us ALL that we have.

My first encounter with Stewardship was in middle

school. I helped pack sandwiches and other products into bags for the less fortunate of our community. I viewed it as something we were doing as an obligation to our Catholic faith. Later, I saw the invitation I was being given to dive deeper into my identity as a servant of Jesus Christ.
