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Whether you are just beginning your stewardship journey or have been living a stewardship way of life for years, today's readings invite us to ask ourselves an important question.

The question is this: "What do you treasure?" Of course, we all know the "right" answer: we treasure our faith, our family, and our friendships. But Jesus tells us in the Gospel passage from Luke how we can discover the real answer to this question. He says, "For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be."

To discern what we really treasure, we need to do a check on our hearts. We can each ask ourselves, "Where do I spend the majority of my energy? Where do I find my thoughts dwelling? How do I choose to spend my time when I find myself with a few spare moments? What do my spending habits reveal about my what is important to me?

As Christian stewards, we are called to live our lives in grateful response to all that God has given us. Do I recognize and treasure these gifts?



Good Stewards Avoid "Compassion Fatigue"

One of the spiritual maladies Christians face today is "compassion fatigue." The media inundates us with details of disasters, natural and made, far and wide. We can't turn on the television without being assailed by news stores of another event that cries to us for help, and our mailboxes are full of pleas from worthy charities.

We try to give out of a sense of compassion, but the needs of the world overwhelm us. Generous givers become "fatigued" and grow weary. We can't respond to all the problems and crises in the world, can we?

Of course we can't respond to the cries of a suffering world with our comparatively meager resources. If we try to respond to every crisis, to say "yes" to very loud or consistent pleas for help, it is no surprise that we feel tired and discouraged.

Good stewards understand that, though Christ calls them to embrace a needy world with compassion, they cannot solve the world's problems themselves and that a balance must be struck in their spiritual lives. Christian stewards prayerfully discern how they are able to respond to the needs of the world. They budget their time and resources so that their response can be generous but focused, sacrificial but not overwhelming. They begin with a prayerful commitment to their immediate family of faith.

Being generous to one's faith community can go a long way toward meeting the needs of others. The decision to give is made prudentially and without guilt. For others, a well thought-out approach to supporting other charitable causes can be part of their stewardship planning as well. But for Chrisian stewards the giving does not stop there. Good stewards realize that the greatest gift they can give is the gift of prayer. Compassion, in its Latin roots, means "suffering with," and through prayer we can be drawn powerfully into solidarity with those who suffer.

The Parable of the Good Samaritan in the Gospel of St. Luke is often seen as Jesus' example of compassionate giving. The Samaritan saw the man near death lying at the side off the road not just with his eyes, but with a compassionate heart. It is the kind of compassionate heart good stewards seek to cultivate within themselves through prayer, planning and focused generosity; ready to respond.

Here at Blessed Trinity, we have a major ministry to the local poor primarily through Brother's Keeper but also some special requests that come in through our office. We have, as a parish, major outreach to poor countries—especially Haiti, Dominic Republic, Honduras, Bogue, Belize and our sister parish, Nalweyo, Uganda. In all of those we succeed in giving 100% of our donations to the poor we are serving—not 80% or 60% or down to 20% or 0%. Personally, I do not give to causes presented on TV because it has been proven over and over again that a very large % of the donations goes to advertising, salaries, office expenses, etc. The two that come out the best are CRS and Food for the Poor. About 80% of your donation goes to the poor. But, if you want the poor to get 100%, we as a parish, so far, have succeeded in giving your donations to the cause you have specified.

Oh—also—it is good to be back.

A STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus concludes his teaching about those who are "faithful and prudent stewards" with that classic stewardship teaching: "Much will be required of the person entrusted with much, and still more will be demanded of the person entrusted with more." Christian stewards recognize that God is the ultimate source of their gifts, talents, resources and aptitudes, and that God wants them to use these varied gifts in his service. This week might be a good time to reflect on our God-given gifts. Are we using those gifts to serve the Lord? If Christ came back to us unexpectedly tomorrow, would we be able to give a full accounting of how we have exercised stewardship over these gifts?

Practicing Good Stewardship in Our Parishes

We're still in the grip of a hot and sunny summer, but August brings a wake-up call. By August's end, visiting relatives have gone home, schools will be open, swimming pools will be closed, and college kids have packed up and left for the halls of academia. What's all that mean for the Christian steward? As we journey through August, parishes begin to teem with plans and new vitality.



The parish is where the church lives, and stewards are the lifeblood of a successful parish. In the parish, we find community and support, liturgy and ritual, sacrament and healing. In the parish, we find a way to give and a way to receive. On a practical level, fall is the time when parish planning gears up for the seasons ahead. Now, for a Christian steward, is the time to prayerfully consider your own involvement in the life of the parish in the coming year. How might we serve—and be served? The Christian steward knows participation in the parish is a win-win situation, feeding us as we feed others.

Where to begin? Your parish website or office may provide a list of ministries. Consider your own unique gifts and respond in a way that nourishes your soul! Maybe you're the party planner who'd love to serve on a social committee. Or perhaps you have a heart for helping the bereaved. Are you called to lector, or perhaps to take the eucharist to the homebound? Maybe this is the year you need to soak in the fruits of adult education. Possibly you see a ministry missing and want to propose it. Perhaps, as a long time steward, you want to be part of revitalizing the stewardship efforts of your parish.

August is a perfect time to reflect on where—not "if" - you are called. August provides time to decompress from a busy, fun summer and pray about where your own road to discipleship leads you next.
